

Participating in a poster session? Here is a suggested format for your poster. The top center panel must contain your project title, and the names of you, your professor, and your course. Below that, you must have an abstract of your project.

Your other panels can have various titles, like: Sketch of Proof; Connections; Applications; Open Problems; Conclusion. Dr. Wheeland and Dr. Adler have some photos of past posters.

Materials: You should use tri-fold poster board (preferably white) that is either 24 or 36 inches high. (It's probably easier for you if you use the larger size.) A typical width is 48 inches. The cost is just over \$6 at a place like Office-Max.

## **ABSTRACT**

A brief description of your project goes here.

Don't use the lowest section of the poster if you're going to display objects in front of it. Otherwise, do.

Content: Your poster should present a summary, emphasizing your main point, and without too much technical detail. Presentation is important, so feel free to include examples, pictures, diagrams, or whatever else will help to get your point across.

Style: Use large type, lots of white space, and an attractive layout. In other words, make the whole presentation visible to feeble, middle-aged professors and administrators.

Exception: If you cite references, feel free to do so in small print.

Caveat: Note that the page you are reading now is essentially a wall of text. Don't do that.
